Integrated Data to Support the Implementation of Syndemic Programming

The intersecting of the HIV, hepatitis, STI and drug-use related epidemics require a modern change to the public health landscape. The integration of data systems expands the capacity of state and local health departments to adequately respond to syndemic challenges, by providing a robust understanding of the intricate connections between health conditions. Scaling data system integration efforts and cross-agency collaboration



support the implementation of comprehensive prevention and care activities. This session will highlight examples of how states have used integrated data from different databases and software systems to increase the capacity of health departments to improve how they monitor the epidemics and improve health outcomes through improved response to the needs of people with HIV, Hepatitis, and other STIs.

4:30 – 5:45 PM Capitol Room	Toward a Syndemic Provider Network: Expanding Access, Fostering Collaboration, and Diversifying Funding Strategies Strategically managing provider networks can transform population-level health outcomes across infectious diseases, however, it is often a fraught process. This session discusses an array of mechanisms available to health departments to manage provider networks to improve the delivery of integrated HIV, STI, hepatitis, DUH, and primary care services using statusnatural and syndemic frameworks. Speakers will discuss tools to pinpoint provider network gaps by health outcome, service, and population served. We will also cover funding, policy, TA, and other mechanisms that health departments can use to drive service alignment and integration within and across provider agencies. Speakers will discuss opportunities to engage primary care providers though billing-based contracts instead of grants, and strategies to integrate the jurisdiction-level system of care beyond contracted service delivery, including outbreak response engagement across provider networks.

Communities of Care for the Syndemics Workforce: Addressing Grief, Loss, and Turnover While Cultivating Mutually Supportive Responses

This session will explore multiple levels of loss that occur within both health departments and community-based organizations, the impacts of these losses, effectively crafting trauma informed responses, and exploring strategies to create systems of mutual care and support. This guided discussion facilitated by NASTAD's Drug User Health team will debrief several instances of recent losses—including programmatic loss, legislative setbacks, human loss, leadership transition, and organizational and workforce turnover—with a lens towards how we, as a community/communities can and do, build networks of care and support for each other. We will also highlight and explore ways that NASTAD has and can assist creating systems of support for our members, their staff, and the community-based organizations they support, especially drug user health and syndemic-based programming.

Leveraging the HIV Response for Hepatitis C: Envisioning Rapid Start for Hepatitis C

The federal government continues to take tremendous steps towards the goal to eliminate hepatitis by 2030 through several efforts proposed under a national elimination effort including a wide scale procurement plan for treatment and point-of-care diagnostic testing. Advances in HIV diagnostic testing and guidance has led to rapid start for HIV which provides a foundation to jump start test and treat for hepatitis C. This session is discussion-based and will be led by health department staff responsible for overseeing both HIV and hepatitis implementation activities within their jurisdictions and will include what components of the current public health infrastructure can support rapid start for hepatitis C and what is needed to truly eliminate hepatitis C by 2030.
