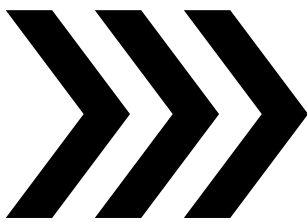

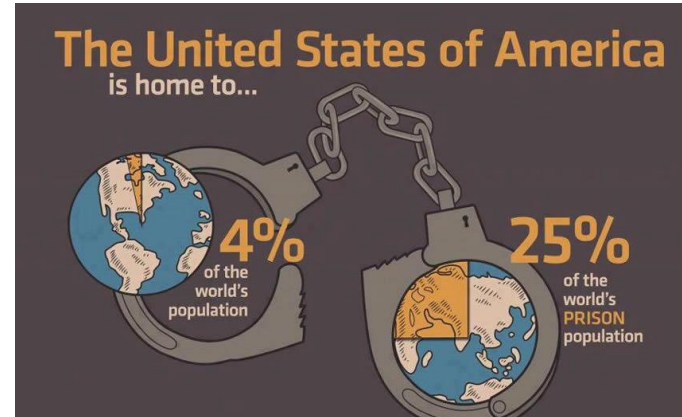

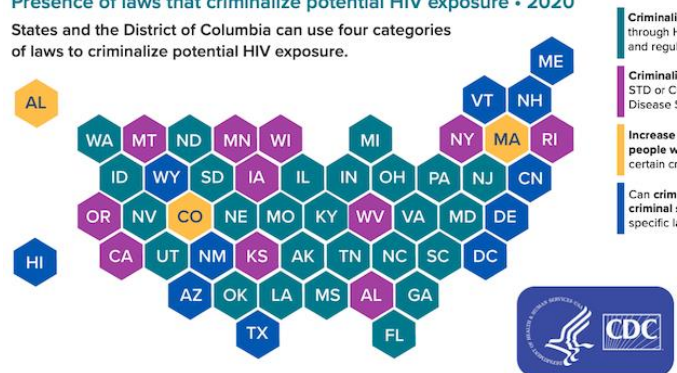

States and the District of Columbia can use four categories of laws to criminalize potential HIV exposure.

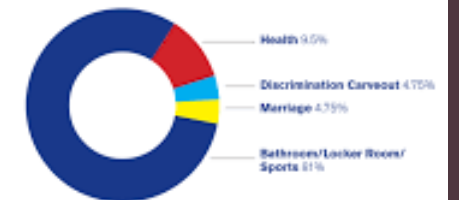


ANTI-TRANSGENDER LEGISLATION SPREADS NATIONWIDE, BILLS TARGETING TRANSGENDER CHILDREN SURGE

2015

125 TOTAL BILLS TRACKED, 21 OF WHICH WERE ANTI-TRANS:

17 bathroom/locker rooms/sports, 2 health (including prisoner healthcare), 1 anti-trans marriage, and 1 discrimination carveout.
