

The HIV and Hepatitis C Programs are responsible for the surveillance and prevention throughout the State of Arizona, including:


- Collection and analysis of epidemiological data.

## How we use a syndemic approach

Syndemic is a synergistic epidemic, or linked health care and/or social issue that interacts in such a way that compounds the impact on populations that are more greatly affected by key epidemics.

#### What has data shown us?

- Intersections exist
- Many patients face gaps in care

#### What are our community partners demonstrating?

- Integration is happening!
- More groups are co-locating, or incorporating warm referrals There are opportunities to offer more support




# How are we integrating hep C, HIV, STI into elimination

- Encourage buy-in of the plan among partners


# Planning Process

- Thousands of needs assessment surveys
- Four pillar workgroups with community members
- Hep Free AZ and SWAG (HIV Statewide Advisory Group) consensus


