10:35 AM – 12:00 PM	Plenary Session: Leveraging Research Partnerships Across Academia, the Public Health Workforce, and Community Partners Public health leaders working to end intersecting HIV and hepatitis epidemics benefit greatly from minimizing silos and maximizing partnerships with peers from varied disciplines. This plenary will highlight successful research partnerships, while addressing existing partnership gaps – particularly among community leaders. Facilitated discussion will particularly call out the need for better allyship with and among researchers who identify as BIPOC, transgender, and/or queer. As an action item following this session, participants will be asked to consider what research collaboratives their health departments have explored or may be willing to explore soon.
