

Denver Principles Rating (DPR) -- What is it?

Co-create a transparent rating(s) to <u>increase accountability</u> and <u>effectiveness of</u> <u>HIV services</u> while strengthening movements for health and human rights.

Focus Areas:

- Governance
- 2. Program and policy development
- 3. Civic engagement
- 4. Advocacy
- 5. Treatment information



The DPR aligns with NASTAD's mission of **advancing the health and dignity** of those affected by HIV/AIDS, viral hepatitis, and intersecting epidemics by strengthening governmental public health and fostering community partnerships.
