Why Advocacy?

- Educate about basics of public health programs
- Share progress and success stories (think broadly!)
- Remind decision makers that significant needs still exist
- Create relationships and trusted partnerships
- Public health is intrinsically connected to policymaking and, in the best case, a feedback loop with policymakers

Advocacy vs. Lobbying

Advocacy is a process aimed at bringing about change on behalf of a particular goal, program, or popular.

- Telling an elected official how a loss of HIV prevention funding would affect your public health programs and community.
- Developing educational materials that show progress being made in reversing opioid overdoses.
- Maintaining health department social media site with information about statistics and events.
- Sending policymakers, including elected officials, your latest reports or newsletters that outline.

Lobbying is an attempts influence a legislative body through communication with government officials.


- Asking an elected official to offer an amendment to increase HIV prevention funding.
- Including a message to support a bill to support a state standing order for prescription of naloxone.
- "Tweeting" a message asking your state legislator to vote against Medicaid work requirements.
- Emailing a group of people with a "call to action."

Avenues for Educating

- Meeting with elected officials at the national and local level is not the only way to make a difference
- Provide background information and statistics on particular topics of interest or in an elected official's district
- Write a letter to the editor
- Create tools to share information dashboards, specialized reports on topics or populations, factsheets on success stories
- Create coalitions and partnerships to further goals

Use existing planning activities and advisory groups to ensure broad coalitions with reach into different public and private sectors.



Use meetings to give and receive policy updates from community members, area business, etc. to identify shared goals and insights into policymakers.
